Summer Reading

Reading keeps your mind active, it increases your vocabulary, it improves the fluidity and fluency of your speaking skills, and it makes you think. Some people love to read and some do not. Summer reading assignments are not meant as punishments. This assignment is meant to keep your mind sharp, allow the class to have some open discussion about common topics from the book, and allow me to see how well you comprehend the major parts of a story.

ONE BOOK ONE CLASS! The book you will read this summer is "Out of My Mind" by Sharon Draper.

Eleven-year-old Melody has a photographic memory. She's the smartest kid in her whole school - but no one knows it, because Melody can't talk. She can't walk. She can't write. Melody's story is one full of heartache and hope. Get ready to meet a girl whose voice you'll never, ever forget.

Your assignment is to write a Literary Letter to Mrs. Gulla about reading the novel. When writing a literary letter you can write anything about the book. It's not a book report, so don't spend time describing the plot. Talk about what struck you about the book. Make connections between yourself and the book.

A good literary letter will:

- 1. Paragraph 1: title, author, genre of the book. A BRIEF summary (5-6 sentences only)
- Paragraph 2: Should include at least 3 of the following:
 Make connections; Discuss a quote with page number from the book; Explain an image through symbolizing; Make a characterization of any one character; Discuss a memorable event; Discuss the theme; Use examples of the literary terms you have learned in class.
- 3. Paragraph 3: Give a recommendation for the book and tell why you like or disliked it.

A small sample of a literary letter appears on the back of this paper. This assignment will be due in print on the first day of school! We will also use this novel for our first graded writing assignment.
