Summer Reading

Reading keeps your mind active, it increases your vocabulary, it improves the fluidity and fluency of your speaking skills, and it makes you think. Some people love to read and some do not. Summer reading assignments are not meant as punishments. This assignment is meant to keep your mind sharp, allow the class to have some open discussion about common topics from the book, and allow me to see how well you comprehend the major parts of a story.

The book you will read this summer is "Nothing But The Truth" by Avi.

Nothing But the Truth examines the imperfect nature of what humans call the truth. The novel is a documentary, drawing its "facts" from a variety of memos, conversations, letters and a diary. The novel illustrates how inaccuracies and outright lies can be magnified by politics and the media. The author, Avi, suggests that information is only as accurate as the original source.

There are 19 chapters in this book. As you read, you will create a literary response journal for each chapter. You should date the top and then write a short summary of the chapter in a few sentences. Please use and highlight the following terms: characters, protagonist, setting, rising action, climax, falling action, resolution, conflict, theme, foreshadowing, irony)

After the summary include a reflection of that chapter.

A sample of a response entry appears below. This assignment will be due in print on the first day of school. We will also use this novel for our first graded writing assignment.

EXAMPLE:
